



Lesson Plan Summary Magic Tree House #36: Sunlight on the Snow Leopard

"A Mountain of Writing"

Informational Writing

EACH STUDENT WILL:

- Read and discuss new vocabulary words and historical/scientific facts in the #36 Sunlight on the Snow Leopard and Snow Leopards and Other Wild Cats Fact Tracker.
- View and discuss anticipatory informational video clips
- Compose a list of nouns, verbs, adjectives and adverbs related to snow leopards
- Draw a diagram, illustration, or map with a caption.
- Write a one or three paragraph (depending on level) informational writing piece using main idea, three supporting details and a concluding sentence.






Lesson Plan Magic Tree House #36: Sunlight on the Snow Leopard

INFORMATIONAL WRITING



- Explore Nepal and the Himalayan Mountains with Jack and Annie
- Set schema for the students with anticipatory activities to anchor their understanding of this journey
- Conclude with a "question technique" writing strategy to teach paragraph writing using main idea, detail sentences and a concluding sentence.

OVERALL PROCEDURE:

This lesson writing activity can be leveled to:

- **Early writing level** Scaffold "one paragraph informational writing" for a beginning writer.
- **Intermediate level -** Introduce "three paragraph informational writing" by combining the three pre-write paragraphs.


For the purpose of this lesson, the three pre-writes are related so they can be re-written as a three paragraph writing piece.

LESSON ONE

Nepal – On Top of the World



Suggestion: Explore Nepal and the Himalayan Mountains to set the scene for the paragraph pre-write. Use this map which is also on the student pre-write.

MATERIALS NEEDED:

- #36 Sunlight on the Snow Leopard
- Snow Leopards and Other Wild Cats Fact Tracker
- Links to you-tube videos (in Directions)
- Classroom maps or books to provide schema (optional)
- Copy of Nepal paragraph pre-write worksheet for each student (In Appendix)
- Copy of paragraph final draft paper for each student (In Appendix)

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. To give the students some schema (background knowledge) of the Nepal area, show these video clips before reading #36 Sunlight On The Snow Leopard
 - The Himalayas from 20,000 ft. Teton Gravity Research (2:30)

- 2. Start reading the #36 Sunlight on the Snow Leopard and use passages in the Snow Leopards and Other Wild Cats Fact Tracker to establish where Nepal is on the map (pages 33-34), use classroom globes, maps, or any other supporting materials to support the lesson.
- 3. Present the pre-write worksheet to create a paragraph with main idea, details, and concluding sentence.
- 4. Suggested Teacher Answer Key answers will vary:

Title: Nepal – On Top of the World

Main idea: Nepal is a small country in Asia.

Detail: India and China share the Himalayan Mountains with Nepal.

Detail: Mt. Everest is the highest mountain peak in the world.

Detail: Snow Leopards live in the highest mountains of Nepal.

Concluding sentence: Nepal has the highest mountains in the world.

LESSON TWO

The Amazing Body of the Snow Leopard



Suggestion: Create a diagram (use a photograph or a directed draw) as the students learn and discuss and label the body part adaptations.

MATERIALS NEEDED:

- #36 Sunlight on the Snow Leopard
- Snow Leopards and Other Wild Cats Fact Tracker
- Links to you-tube videos (in Directions)
- Classroom books, stuffed animals or relics to provide schema (optional)
- Copy of The Amazing Body of the Snow Leopard paragraph pre-write for each student (in Appendix)
- Copy of paragraph final draft for each student (in Appendix)

DIRECTIONS:

1. As you are reading the book #36 Sunlight on the Snow Leopard, show these two short you-tube videos about Snow Leopards and Teaching Tool fact cards:

- 2. Next, brainstorm as a class, and jot down on a large classroom chart some of the words and facts that described the snow leopard.
- Create a diagram of the snow leopard's adaptive body parts for easy reference. (optional)
- 4. Present the pre-write worksheet to create a paragraph with main idea, details, and concluding sentence.
- 5. Suggested Teacher Answer Key answers will vary:

Title: The Amazing Body of the Snow Leopard

Main idea: The snow leopard's body has adapted to cold weather.

Detail: Its nose is like a heater for breathing in the cold air.

Detail: The leopard wraps its very long tail around its body like a blanket to keep warm.

Detail: The paws are like snowshoes, so the leopard can walk on the snow.

Concluding sentence: These amazing body parts help the snow leopard survive in extremely cold weather.

LESSON THREE

The Mystery of the Snow Leopard



Suggestion: Enlarge this picture and ask students to find the snow leopard.

MATERIALS NEEDED:

- #36 Sunlight on the Snow Leopard
- Snow Leopards and Other Wild Cats Fact Tracker
- Chart paper for brainstorming with students
- Copy of The Mystery of the Snow Leopard paragraph pre-write for each student (in Appendix)
- Copy of paragraph final draft for each student (in Appendix)

DIRECTIONS:

1. As you are reading the book #36 Sunlight on the Snow Leopard and Snow Leopards and other Wild Cats Fact Tracker, brainstorm with the students and keep a running class list of nicknames, and descriptive words for the snow leopard. Jot down on a large classroom chart some of these descriptive words. Here is a suggested list:

- 2. Present the pre-write worksheet to create a paragraph with main idea, details, and concluding sentence.
- 3. Suggested Teacher Answer Key answers will vary:

Title: The Mystery of the Snow Leopard

Main idea: The snow leopard is camouflaged to hide from people and animals.

Detail: The spotted fur of this animal can blend in with rocks and snow.

Detail: The leopard goes fast, high and long in one jump, seeming to disappear.

Detail: They feel shy and run away from people.


Concluding sentence: Snow leopards are called Cloud Climbers, the Gray Ghost of the Mountains and the Guardian of the Mountains.

Directions: Write a paragraph with a main idea, three supporting details, and a concluding sentence by answering these questions. **WRITE COMPLETE SENTENCES.**


Title: The Amazing Body of the Snow Leopard
