- Suggested video clips for anticipatory lesson openers (in Resources)
- One file folder for each student to store lesson activities (optional)

PREP:

- Tri-fold the activity sheet placing the poem on top. The students can use it as a bookmark if they have their own book, or store it in a folder with the other activities used in *TIME OF THE TURTLE KING*.
- Pre-view the Resource section for other related books and video clips to use as anticipatory activities to provide schema for the students.

DIRECTIONS:

PART ONE: FIND THE RHYMES - A quick lesson to teach students to recognize an ABCB pattern of rhyming.

1. Give each student a copy of the *Morgan's Message worksheet*.
2. Teach or review the concept of a stanza (a grouped set of two or more lines in order to divide a poem).
3. Teach or review the ABCB style of poetry. (Lines two and four in each stanza rhyme).
4. Tell the students to find the rhyming words in each one of the four stanzas in the poem and circle them.
5. To extend this lesson, show the Magic Tree House books #'s 30 -37, where Morgan's messages are also in an ABCB poem style. Or challenge them to find poems in other poetry books and search for this pattern.




PART TWO: FIND IT AND PROVE IT- This part of the lesson will continue throughout this book's reading.

1. The student will open their tri-fold bookmark after reading Chapter 2.
2. Re-read the poem together.
3. Ask the students if the first stanza has been solved yet. Guide them to see that the first stanza is solved on page 16 if they don't already know. They write 16 in the square for the page number. Next, they will write what proves that it was solved.
4. As the students follow Jack and Annie's adventure, they will continue to solve each stanza of the poem. The student will write the page number in the box to cite where they solved the clue. Next, the student will write a sentence proving how they know it was solved.
